The New Zealand pattern was created in collaboration with local textile artist, Fiona Collins. The pattern speaks to the coming together of mountains, people and cultures.



SOCCER AT THE CORE

Soccer is what brings the world together and thus a ball sits at the center of the emblem, drawing together the 32 participating nations.

AUSTRALIAN ART PATTERN

The Australian pattern was created in collaboration with local artist Chern'ee Sutton. The traveling lines and the circles, both traditional motifs, evoke the notion of a journey and the places we must travel to and through to reach our destination.

FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP™ TROPHY

The simplified version of the iconic silhouette of the FIFA Women's World Cup trophy is a reminder of the ultimate prize up for grabs in the tournament.

NEW ZEALAND

- The country consists of two main islands and 700+ smaller islands
- New Zealand became a British colony in 1841 and independence was gained in many small steps, not all at once, so the country does not have a national "Independence Day"
- The Māori are indigenous Polynesian people of mainland New Zealand who have inhabited their land since the 1300s
- New Zealand's national sports teams, most notably the All Blacks national rugby team, perform the haka – a ceremonial dance in Māori culture – before every match
- Famous New Zealanders include Russell Crowe, Lorde, Peter Jackson, Israel Adesanya, Dan Carter, Anna Paquin, KJ Apa, Jonah Lomu, Steven Adams, Edmund Hillary and Richie McCaw
